

and I rushed out to the nearest nursery to fill my garden with beautiful Spring bloomers, which is pretty much all you could find at the nursery back then. I worked so hard cleaning, preparing and planting and then reveled in my success! But, as the end of May rolled around, my charming Spring bloomers faded and the weeds crept in. By mid-June, my garden no longer felt inviting and I started to avoid it. By late-Summer, it seemed too late to do anything about it - choked with weeds, perennials overgrown and starving. I repeated this folly for several years asking myself, "Why am I starting over from scratch every year? I want to Summer garden, too!"

Nowadays, I get to enjoy my Summer garden, whether I'm planting, tending or laying around all day in a lounge chair, reading a good book surrounded by my favorite flowers, looking up now and then to watch and listen to the bees, birds and butterflies that come to visit. But here's what I had to learn first:

How important it is to plant Summer, Fall and everbloomers to entice me out into my garden. You can plant them in Spring for Summer bloom or even much later for next Summer's pleasure. Think Asters, Agastaches, Zinnias, Marigolds, Rudbeckias, Salvias, Dahlias and Sunflowers. While you're planting or cutting Summer flowers for bouquets, you'll undoubtedly look around and think "I ought to..."

Aster novae-angliae 'Skyscraper' A monster of an Aster, Skyscraper' grows quickly to make a super smashin' 5' x 5' statement with tons of 2.5-3" amber-centered periwinkle flowers for several months. A highly reliable perennial with many multi-branching



show-off and gets even more bloomy each successive year. Perfect in mid-bed, especially paired with yellow roses. Cut flowers and butterflies galore! Deer resistant! Rich soil. area. And while you're weeding, you'll notice... Plants or shrubs that need to be deadheaded, cut back, or pruned. So you do a little of that, too. And, again, it's surprisingly pleasurable. Now, time to sweep the clippings away, but what have we here? Why, compacted soil - a natural occurrence over time and from stepping in the garden. Not good, as most plants flourish best when their roots are allowed air and easy access to water. So you...

Pull weeds! Yes, every weed you pull prevents legions! And once

you get down on your knees and start pulling out a few, it's somehow

satisfying and hard to stop! Before you know it, you've weeded a whole

Turn over the soil where it's compacted, or use your shovel to cut a few slices into it. This is more helpful than you would think for healthy plants and while you're at it you might as well...

Feed some hungry shrubs and perennials that look a bit yellow or stunted. Side-dress with good quality compost – it's amazing how much and how your fast your plants will respond! And you're improving the health of your soil - the most important thing you can do for your garden!

So, my friends, don't forget to add Summer bloomers when getting your Spring garden going. You'll be enticed and the rewards are many!

Gaillardia aristata 'Amber Wheels'

I prefer my "Blanket Flowers" not so squatty or "roundymoundy" as someone recently described the more modern varieties to me. Long, upright stems, tallest in rich loamy soil, are super for cut flower bouquets. Frilly golden blooms boasting a prominent red button "eye" are larger than usual, to 3.5" across! Tougher and longer-lived than the modern varieties, the show gets more impressive in year 2 and is well worth the wait. Blooms Summer-Fall. Bees and butterflies! Drought tolerant once established. Deer resistant. To 2-3' tall. Deciduous. Sun. Avg./Low water. Perennial USDA zones 4-10. #4887 \$7.95 3+\$7.50



Rudbeckia hirta 'Cherry Brandy'

Staff pick! A favorite here at the nursery, big ruby to raspberry 2-4" "Black-Eyed-Daisies" abound on upright stems early Summer to Fall with deadheading. Abides clay-ish soil but SO much better in rich loam. Deer resistant. Self-sows! To 2' x 16". Sun/ Part sun. Avg./Low water. Short-lived perennial USDA zones 5-10, annual elsewhere.
